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New EO Extends the "Stay Home" Order and Reopens Manufacturing

On Thursday, Governor Whitmer announced an extension to the current "stay home, stay safe" order, which is the order that keeps dealership showrooms closed. (Temporarily suspending certain activities that are not necessary to sustain or protect life.) The previous "stay home" order was set to expire on May 15, 2020. The new Executive Order 2020-77 extends this through May 28, 2020.

While the date has been extended, the order does not change anything else about the way dealerships are currently operating. However, if your dealership does not already have a formal preparedness and response plan, it will be necessary to develop one, in accordance of Section 11(a) of the EO.

- 11) Businesses, operations, and government agencies that remain open for in-person work must, at a minimum:
- (a) Develop a COVID-19 preparedness and response plan, consistent with recommendations in Guidance on Preparing Workplaces for COVID-19, developed by the Occupational Health and Safety Administration and available <u>here</u>. Such plan must be available at company headquarters or the worksite.

Governor Whitmer also announced her MI Safe Start Plan, which outlines how we will begin to reengage while continuing to keep our communities safe. Re-engagement will happen in six phases. She has stated that the businesses necessary to protect and sustain life are already open. As we move into lower-risk phases, additional business categories will re-open and the restrictions on public gatherings and social interactions will ease.

The governor has stated that Michigan is currently in phase 3.

MI Safe Start Plan: Phase 3, Flattening

Of significance to our industry, manufacturing reopens

Phase 3 is defined as daily new cases and deaths remaining relatively constant over a time period. As part of this phase, manufacturing is again permitted with additional safety measures and guidelines. Executive Order 2020-77 will allow manufacturing workers, including those at Michigan's Big 3 auto companies, to resume work on or after Monday, May 11.

The governor appears to be following her previous EO in allowing the top of the supply chains to open and then follow with the downstream businesses. She is remaining consistent in saying she is the only one who can make the decision as to when a business can open.

DADA, MADA and ADM continue to provide the governor with information daily on the need to open dealership showrooms. We have written joint letters, emailed and phoned her team daily, and continue to work with the legislative leaders and members to advocate for the reopening. As we learn more, we will follow up with dealers.

MI Safe Start Plan: Controlling Spread in the Workplace

In announcing the six phases, Governor Whitmer has also provided "best practices" that workplaces should follow, with different levels of importance depending on the industry. The proper implementation of these best practices will mitigate risk in the workplace and allow for a safe and sustained return to work. If workplaces fail to follow some or all of these guidelines, it may curb the state-wide progress toward the revitalization phase and result in a re-instating of stricter social limitations.

These best practices fall into five categories:

- Access control: Implementing best practices to quickly identify and catalogue potential introductions of COVID-19 into the workplace
- Social distancing: Minimizing levels of close contact within the workplace to limit the spread of COVID-19 among workers
- Sanitation / Hygiene: Increasing both the frequency and vigor of common cleaning practices as well as implementing new ones to reduce the amount of time COVID-19 can live on surfaces
- PPE: Ensuring all employees have access to personal protective equipment to keep them from both contracting and transmitting the COVID-19 virus
- Contact tracing / Isolation: Designing and imparting to employees important procedures and protocols on what occurs if an employee is suspected to have and/ or diagnosed with COVID-19
